Today, I face yet another Honor, that is to address you: all of our distinguished members. I have been troubled by this letter, as we have had a difficult time since our last Reunion. We have lost many

wonderful friends as long time members and very distinguished Veterans. It is difficult to come up with words adequate to Honor our lost members and their families. I have tried and have decided to say simply: We will miss all of our departed Veterans, BUT WE WILL NEVER FORGET ANY OF YOU. As a further tribute to those departed, I decided to try hard to make these difficult times become more an "HONOR" to all departed and all remaining. To this end, I must thank Jack Koser for coming to my rescue only a few days ago. In my inadequate search for a way to create this Honor, I could not come up with a way until Jack's email arrived.

In this fortuitous email, Jack sent an article concerning the infamous "Doolittle Raiders". These gentlemen wished a message be received by the Japanese Empire. They took on an unbelievable Mission to bomb Japan long before we had any of the Pacific Islands from which to launch such an assault. And they did this before the B-29 long range bomber was even on the drawing board. The mission required that, at the last minute, the 80 members make a decision to fly with the knowledge that they would not have enough fuel to return. Their decision was quick and correct: they took off and delivered their message to the Empire. I shall not recant the story further here, but invite all of you to Google "The cup of brandy that no one wants to drink". It will recant the entire fascinating and honorable story of these men we all must remember and honor.

The story reminded me that it is time for all of us in the 6th Bomb Group to find an appropriate way to Honor our Veteran members with a similar cup of brandy, excellent wine or very old Whiskey "that no one wants to drink". After the many horrific battles for the South Pacific Islands, Tinian among them, our men of the 6th, faced many difficult missions also. The creation of the B-29 and the capture of Tinian and Iwo Jima made our assault possible, but what could easily be described as "ragged edge". By that, I mean the available fuel and bomb load required for Tokyo bomb runs, was very close to not quite enough to return. Some will attest to Iwo Jima being a God Send to refuel, my Dad among them. Without Iwo Jima, I would not be here at all, as my Father would probably not have made it back to the relative safety of a remote Island in the Pacific for which many American lives were sacrificed. The strategic thinking, planning, sacrifices and violent battles for South Pacific Islands are why we enjoy the Freedoms that make us who we are and what we have achieved. I believe I mentioned in the last letter to all of you that I would not be what I am today without the phenomenal sacrifices these men made for all of us currently enjoying the prosperity of the United States of America. I do not know how to thank them enough. Virgil Morgan mentioned to me in an email responding to Jack's "The cup of brandy that no one wants to drink" that the 6th BG was honored to have

The Board and I will find a similar analogy to "The cup of Brandy" and report at our Reunion.

the islands: Dan Owens, an aircrew member on "FIFI" the only flying B-29 in the world; David Wilson, whose father, Sgt. Bernard Wilson left blister gunner on "Anonymous IV" crew in the 6th Bomb Group; Brent Petrie, whose uncle participated in the liberation of Saipan as member of the 2nd Marine Division; and Hume "Andy" Giles, whose father served as a member of the 4th Marine Division and whose uncle was a 67th Battalion Seabee on Tinian and helped build North Field.

The Valor Tour group, held a ceremony on Tinian on March 18th with Mayor Ramone M. Dela Cruz who joined the group for an evening cookout. Upon retuning home David Wilson sent Pirate's Log books to Island officials and all members of the tour group.




Bob Reagan – Remembered

Robert "Doc" Reagan of Lowell, MI passed away February 16, 2013



Bob met Carol Callan while they were students at Marquette University in Milwaukee. After graduation in 1953 the newlyweds chose to start a family and establish a dental practice in Lowell, Michigan. They wasted no time succeeding at both, and their family kept growing and making a mark in Lowell. Over time he was the recipient of numerous awards and honors and was selected as a Fellow in the American College of Dentists. The nominating endorsement cited his "family and community contributions, his professional competence, his quiet leadership, friendliness and kindly manners". His dental colleagues also awarded him the Distinguished Service Award, which states, in part, "...an overview of his private, family, civic and professional life might serve as a guide for how to apply family values so that America would be enriched throughout all the land if his example were followed".

He was also selected Lowell Area "Person of the Year", an honor that recognized his service to the city through the: Lions Club, United Way Community Fund and Lowell Area School Board and numerous others. Bob will be missed by many as besides leaving nine children and their families, 23 grandchildren, dozens of nieces and nephews, there were former patients, many golf and euchre partners, as well as downhill skiing and hunting buddies.



Ididn't have the privilege of meeting Bob on Tinian nor do I recall meeting him at my first reunion at Omaha in 1982. Knowing so few men in the 6th on Tinian, as I was a late comer to the group, and because dates and time escape me, now I'm not even sure at which reunion we first met. More recently I stayed in touch with Bob by phone in checking on his doctor visits. Our last dinner together was in San Diego with our daughter, and I had just lost my wife a few months before and Bob had lost his a few years earlier. His valuable council he shared with us was heartfelt and just what we needed at that point in time.




Jim Hays Remembered

James L. Hays (Chaplain, Colonel, USAF, Ret.)

passed away at his home in Norman, Oklahoma on February 12, 2013

im was born in Belleville, Arkansas on May 26, 1925, but grew up in Seminole County, Oklahoma, where he graduated from High School in 1942. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps and served during WWII as a Bombardier on B29s in the South Pacific. After the war, he returned to Seminole, married Carolyn McCoy, completed a degree at Oklahoma Baptist University, and moved to Louisville, KY to attend Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. He then returned to active duty as a Chaplain in the United States Air Force, serving at numerous bases



Jim also loved to get out on the water and fish and enjoyed sitting in his chair and reading (and he read on a very wide range of topics). A strong, active member of the First Baptist Church in Norman, Jim was well known for his warm and caring Christian character; indeed, throughout his life he was always concerned for others and reaching out to comfort those who needed encouragement. A loving husband and wonderful father, he also served as the caring "patriarch" for dozens within his wider extended family. Jim influenced hundreds of people throughout his life and, no doubt, there are many who saw him as their role model of what a Christian man should be. He enjoyed this life and projected that joy out to all who came in contact with him.

As editor I had the privilege of profiling Jim Hays in the January 2006 Newsletter and the following are excerpts taken from the very meaningful and heartfelt homily he presented us with at the Sunday morning service closing out the Wichita Reunion. When visiting with him it doesn't take one long to recognize that love has played a large part in his life.

I came to Tinian in the spring of 1945 with my first crew, but Bill Lemme, Aircraft commander and Dick Baumgartner were replaced, as was usual, and I flew until May 24, 1945 with Jay K. Anderson. After the hairy May 24 mission when six of our crew bailed out and were POW's, the four of us, Andy, Bob Creek, Harold Brenholtz, and I went to Hawaii for a couple of weeks. I finished



my bombardier career with Harry George's crew. I remembered on the missions I flew from Tinian, we liked to have Chaplain Murphy come by and wave saying "Hurry Back". The lessons learned during my time with the 6th Bomb Group, served me well as we developed loyalty to our fellow crewmembers and learned to bond tightly and quickly. When Tokyo Rose taunted us by saying Jay K. Anderson's crew were POW's, we cheered as we thought our men were dead.

As the crews began rotating home after August 16th I was made Bombsight and Autopilot Maintenance

Officer. In February the 6th Bomb Group went to Clark Field in the Philippines and I arrived back home in August 1946, barely in time to get into collage.

I stayed in the Air Force Reserves and when about to complete my education in Divinity School, was called back into service. I convinced the Air Force that I would be a better Chaplain than Maintenance Officer, and I went to Travis Air Force Base, cold turkey. There in the row of familiar B-29's on the flight line were many planes with the beautiful Circle R on the tails.

During that period in my life in the military, the second time around from 1952 to 1977, some of the Chaplains that I worked for thought visitation on the flight lines were not important. However, the Commanders thought it was important and moved my efficiency reports to the highest. In fact later I was invited to SAC Headquarters to lead a discussion on the "Flight Line Ministry". So we gather here in Wichita as "old fighters" who spent a chunk

of our youth together. Proud of one another we return the brotherly love developed on Tinian and since nurtured in our old age. Your closeness defined a lot of my ministry. The fellowship with you and the many that are missing is very important to me. This is the highlight of all my meetings, along with family reunions, and I can only understand it by reminding you that you are family to Carolyn and me.

I doubt if all of us will return next time. I do not know how long we will be able to gather, but always "count me in" as you get together. God Bless.

BURIED TREASURE WAS UNDER OUR NOSES! By Harry George

On Monday, September 20, 1638, Captain Don Francisco stood on the deck of his 2000 ton galleon, the Nuestra Senora de la Concepcion, looking out at two small islands and the three mile channel that separated them. Ominous clouds masked the setting

sun. He had been plying the lucrative trade route between Manila and the New World America. The islands were discovered in 1521 by Ferdinand Magellan who named them Islas de los ladrones (Thieves Islands) because they were a rendezvous for pirates. Later they were renamed Tinian and Saipan. His fear when sailing in this area was

seeing another ship bearing down on him with the sign of the 'Jolly Roger' on its sails - Pirates! But this was not to be his fate this time. During the turbulent twenty-four hours to come his undoing was two fold, storms and mutiny aboard his treasure laden ship. Due to the mutiny he was unable to cope with the squalls that would spell the end for him and most of the four hundred people aboard. The ship foundered and was hurled onto a reef in the channel. The precious cargo from the Orient including a solid gold plate and ewer set, a gift from the King of Spain to the Emperor of Japan, spilled into the sea. Three hundred and seven years later in January of 1945 large planes came streaming in


to the four parallel runways hurriedly constructed on the north tip of Tinian Island just three miles from the remains of the Concepcion. Forty-five B-29 aircraft of the 6th Bombardment Group had arrived from the United States to fight a war against Japan. On the sides of the nose of each aircraft were the large distinctive "pirates head and shoulders with skull and bones" logo of the 6th Group. The Pirate emblem was claimed by the Group when it was stationed in the Panama Canal Zone in 1924. If Captain Don Francisco had somehow slipped out of his "time warp", he would have been terri-

fied at the sight! Strangely, the total gross weight of all 6th Group arriving aircraft approximately equaled the gross weight of the Concepcion! After arrival the flight and maintenance crews plus support personnel settled down to the grim business of delivering discouragement to 'the land of the setting sun', Japan. The precious little free time the men had would be spent piling into jeeps and trucks for a few hours at the beautiful beaches. If lucky, they could do some fishing at the invitation of some CB (Construction Battalion) workers who

had the neatest little boats, plus whatever else the 'f1yboys' whom they greatly admired, wanted. It is with regret when we think back that we could have ended a 'time warp' by digging our hands and toes into the sand in the shallow water between the two islands and come up with thousands of pieces of gold and jewelry at the wreck site. It

was not until March of 1987 that an underwater recovery group, Pacific Sea Resources, would arrive to spend months salvaging the cargo from depths of two feet to two hundred feet. A writer for the National Geographic was along and he wrote articles published in the September 1990 issue. Using modern equipment they brought up more than 3,500 pieces of gold, rubies, diamonds and sapphires. One can only imagine what the activity would have been on the islands in 1945 if the word got out. The B-29 crews would have traded with the CBs for diving equipment and flotation gear. Looking back at our production of windmill washing machines, your imagination will tell you what equipment we could have had out in the channel between Tinian and Saipan. Recalling our ingenuity, I would say the 45,000 men on the island would have brought up more. But we had to be content with the "cat's eyes" and "cat's paws" that we brought home. Some of the treasure is still there - anyone up for
